All Praise to the King is a general anthem that may be especially appropriate for Ascension. Its optional second verse is suitable for Easter. Suggested corresponding lectionary readings for Ascension include Psalm 97, John 17:20-26, Acts 16:16-34, and Revelation 22:12-20; one basic homiletical theme is uniting with one voice to praise the Sovereign of heaven and earth. For Easter, suggested corresponding lectionary readings include Psalm 118:14-24, John 20:1-18, Acts 10:34-43, and 1 Corinthians 15:19-26; one basic homiletical theme is praising the risen Lord who rules in triumph over all.

Rehearse this anthem singing staccato “doo” until all of the rhythms are precise and the “call-and-response” texture is cleanly balanced. Continue singing staccato as the choir adds the text, striving for crisp consonants. Finally, add very fluid, legato phrasing without sacrificing the energy and precision of the staccato articulation. Treble voices may perform this anthem, assigning sopranos to Part I and altos to Part II. In performances by mixed voices, women should sing Part I and men Part II.
